

The discharged youth were initially placed on probation with a high YLS/CMI score for education and employment and have reduced their risk related to those key areas by the end of the probation term.

An increase in status youth who are diverted from the juvenile justice system or who receive a decreased term of probation supervision.



Status youth spend 32.9% less time on probation than delinquent youth.



## In the last 3 months

- 351 youth have accessed funds for Community-Based Treatment services.

- 899 youth have accessed funds for **Community-Based Non-Treatment** services.


